I've settled nicely into morning and evening eating routines. The first skill I mastered was listening and waiting for the whistle sound before eating my food. I can even ignore food laying around the kitchen floor and in food courts and restaurants we visit. That makes my Puppy Raiser super proud!

Ringing the bell to go outside is another one of my achievements. I quite like that sound and make sure everyone can hear it throughout the house when I need to 'get busy'. My Puppy Trainer says that I am "very intelligent for my age".

I am doing very well learning the commands: 'sit', 'down', 'stand', 'come', 'heel' and 'stay', 'take it', 'let's go', 'touch' and 'look'. I have quite a large vocabulary for a six-month-old pup. Kibble rewards are always nice to help me remember.

'Bed' is a super important command. Yes, I've got that one down pat, too! I can find my bed as soon as I'm asked, even if it's in another room in the house. This is important, so I have a safe place to go especially when there's a lot of activity around me. Like when someone knocks on the door and enters. It's the best place for me to wait patiently.

Public outings have also helped me practice 'polite greetings', especially when I'm wearing my special blue BC & Alberta Guide Dog jacket. Everyone knows I'm training when I wear it. I'm determined to become a Guide Dog or Service Dog for someone visually impaired, a child with profound Autism, or a Veteran or First Responder with an Operational Stress Injury, like PTSD. That's pretty important and I'm up for it!

Now that I've got all my vaccinations, I've been out and about more. In the past few months, I've taken a bus and even the fast Canada Line to the airport. I started to learn all about 'find the door' and getting on and off. I sure look forward to more experiences like this in the future. Maybe I'll meet you on one of those buses. Just watch out for my blue jacket and you'll know who I am.
