TREASURER'S REPORT – DUES 2022 remain at \$65.00 for Vancouver Vets

On January 1, 2022, the National portion of your dues increased from \$37.00 to \$45.00. The Vancouver Division Executive met on December 5, 2021, and after a discussion based on our Financial Situation, it was voted unanimously that **Vancouver Division will not raise the yearly**

dues for 2022 and they will remain at \$65.00. We will operate our Division on \$20.00 per person instead of \$28.00 per person that we receive from your \$65.00 per annum.

All membership dues are to be paid to the RCMP Veterans' Association in Ottawa, Ontario since the administration of membership information has now been centralized since earlier in 2021.

Contrary to the latest communique from National, Your Dues are not accepted at the Division level, by our Treasurer, Rupert BULLOCK.

Dues are to be paid direct to National by one of the following 3 (three) methods:

- 1. Online (credit card): The January 1, 2022, email provided you with a "simply" one click method to add your Credit Card details and receive immediate confirmation of payment. If you do not receive this email, Members can pay online on the National RCMPVA website by going to: https://rcmpva.org/ "Log in" and click on "Memberships" and on the far right of the page click on the "Renew" option and pay by credit card.
- 2. <u>Cheque</u>: Members wishing to pay by cheque may do so directly to the National association office. **Please provide your name and contact information, and clearly indicate which Division and which year you would like funds applied to**.

3. <u>E-Transfer:</u> Members who choose to pay by E-Transfer, may do so by sending their 2022 Dues to the RCMP Veterans Association, Executive Assistant, Chantal Renaud by e-transfer to <u>chantal.renaud@rcmp-grc.gc.ca</u>.

As of February 10, 2022, we had 270 paid members. For those who have not paid their 2022 dues, please ensure that they are paid up at your earliest convenience. National has advised that for those who have not paid their 2021/2022 Dues, by January 1, 2023, you will be removed from the (Vancouver) RCMP Veterans Association Roster.

If you know of one of our Senior Vets, who has not been able to pay their Dues because of health issues (hospital/care home), please let us know so we can reach out to them.

We urge you to renew, as although travel is limited over the past 2 years (but showing signs of bouncing back), your voice is still important to our Vets.

DIRECTOR OF HEALTH & WELFARE – ADVOCACY:

I had a number of Vets contact me regarding assistance with medical claims and follow up on their pensions.

The recent National Bulletin regarding the absence of the COLA clause on Medical pensions, and the proposed catch up naturally raised a number of enquires that were resolved.

I have recently developed a number of contacts that I can now deal with direct, as a number of employees both RCMP Pension Division and the Veterans Affairs Branch are working from home, and undoubtably a number of phone calls go directly to voice mail at these branches. A lot of the staff with these agencies are going the extra mile to assist during these difficult times.

In my role as Division Advocate, in 2021, 62 assistance files were handled for members, wives, spouses and family members. Some of course could be handled in 1-2 days, while others took up to a week or more, before finally being resolved. All worked out satisfactory for those enquiring whereby these enquiries came from members of the association and others from those were not registered within our Association.

Regardless, ALL of course were provided the guidance and assistance necessary.

We (Executive) may wish to consider additional Advocates within our association for the 2022 year, as I am currently responsible for all enquires for retired members from Sechelt/North Vancouver to Chilliwack/Hope!! This topic will be raised at the next Executive meeting, but any Volunteers are greatly appreciated and encouraged to put contact John!

Foundation To Expand Reach Beyond Helping Veterans Pay Legal Bills Bernise Carolino

"We must keep pushing for justice, and we want to hear from federal leaders on this need," said Stoffer in the statement. "But in the meantime, we'll do as much as we can to give veterans the front-end support they need now," he added.

The Veterans Legal Assistance Foundation is a charitable organization promoting access to justice for current or former members of the Canadian Armed Forces and the RCMP, as well as their family members, by lessening the burden of legal fees relating to administrative tribunals and courts. The foundation's funding originated from the <u>SISIP class action settlement</u>, aiming to assist veterans in acquiring the payments to which they are entitled.

Previously the foundation had been paying for veterans' eligible legal bills up to \$10,000, normally for disability and other claims broadly benefiting veterans. The foundation now expects to do more thanks to the new funding, said Peter Driscoll, founding chair of the foundation and lead counsel on the SISIP class action, in the news release.

"Veterans need help with forms and documents, especially if they are dealing with physical or mental health disabilities," said Dennis Manuge, VLAF ambassador and representative plaintiff for the SISIP class action. Sometimes veterans simply need assistance with using the Veterans Affairs Canada website and not with court proceedings, Manuge added.

The **Toth v. Canada** class action, which challenged the validity of offsets made by the federal government to the disability pension prior to May 29, 2012, <u>resulted in a \$100-million settlement agreement</u>, with unclaimed amounts being considered residual funds. On Jan. 6 the court determined that such residual funds would be paid to four charities: the Veterans Legal Assistance Foundation, the Bursary Fund (Manuge), the Royal Canadian Legion Poppy Fund and Ottawa Inner-City Veterans Outreach and Support.



Did you serve in the Canadian Armed Forces or RCMP?

Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) needs your help reaching veterans who do not receive VAC benefits and services. The department is surveying the veteran community on how they prefer to learn about and access government programs and services. They're looking for veterans, Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) members, former RCMP members, family members and caregivers. This feedback will help VAC reach and serve more Veterans.

The survey will take about 15 minutes to complete. It is being conducted on our behalf by the independent Canadian research firm, EKOS Research Associates Inc.
